Impact of Pupil Premium

- Accelerated learning of vulnerable/targeted groups of pupils
- Reduction in families needing Family Support provision, benefits advice and involvement of other agencies – CAF significantly reduced and impact improved
- Children feel that they achieve well and respond well to challenges when asked in pupil interviews
- Pupils supported in extended learning beyond the curriculum
- Parents provided with support to help engage in their children’s learning and equipping them with the knowledge and skills to do this effectively – Parent feedback positive
- Children who arrive with little or no prior experience of English made rapid progress in their learning.

Why it is important to claim your Free School Meals

The additional funding for children on free school meals is increasing. It will help to support the learning and achievement of your child. Please apply for free school meals if you are eligible.

Parent/guardian must get one of the following:

- Child Tax Credit, (but not Working Tax Credit) and have an annual income (as assessed by HM Revenue & Customs) that does not exceed £16,190
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance • Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- The Guarantee element of State Pension Credit
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999 (for this, you will need to apply directly to the school, NOT to Bradford Council).

*Where a parent is entitled to Working Tax Credit in the 4-week period immediately after their employment stops, or after they start to work less than 16 hours per week, their children are entitled to free school meals for this period.
